Welcome to the first Armed Forces England (North) e-Newsletter hosted by NHS England's North Yorkshire and Humber Area Team (NYH AT).

The newsletter will share information on the latest developments, initiatives, news and good work from across the North West, North East and Yorkshire and Humber regional areas. It will allow us to further communicate the knowledge and expertise within the region in order to ensure the development of services that better meet the needs of Armed Forces serving personnel, veterans and their families and dependents.

In this first edition we focus on:

- the three Armed Forces Networks (AFNs) in the North, their future and how we might want to shape them.
- an update on the NHS Commissioning landscape and responsibilities.
- an overview of Army Primary Health Care Services transitional change to a tri-service role (Army, RAF and Navy) as Defence Primary Health Care (DPHC).

The Armed Forces Networks

AFNs continue to be the recognised forums where all sectors of the health and welfare community; statutory and Third Sector can come together irrespective of organisation or geography.

The NHS briefing 'Supporting planning for 13/14 for direct commissioning' details the transition of AFNs from a host NHS Area Team leadership to a Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG)/local leadership-based model by April 2014, a transition that will be supported and facilitated by NHS England. Bury CCG is already providing leadership and support to the NW AFN whilst the NYH AT is committed to supporting the transition of the NE and Y&H AFNs.

The NYH AT recommendation is to operate two AFNs, reduced from three, reconfiguring on an army brigade footprint with rotational CCG leadership. It is proposed that AFNs report to, and, as such, are accountable to local Health and Wellbeing Boards. Views are currently being sought on the future-proofing of AFNs via an options paper that is being circulated to all stakeholders.

In each edition we would also like to provide a focus for a particular Armed Forces Charity or Service/Ex-Service personnel organisation. For our first edition we have spoken to Debbie Whittington, General Secretary of COBSEO, the Confederation of Service Charities, who is keen to communicate the existence, purpose and benefits of their organisation to the wider community.

Healthcare Commissioning Changes

Following the enactment of the Health and Social Care Act 2013 there have been considerable changes in commissioning responsibilities for the wider Armed Forces Community.

NHS England's NYH AT is one of 3 lead area teams nationally that are now responsible for commissioning health services for AF serving personnel and their dependents, where registered with a Defence Medical Services (DMS) Practice. NHS CCGs hold statutory responsibility for all secondary and community services required for veterans, reservists and their families and serving families not registered with a DMS GP. Bespoke services for veterans, such as veterans' mental health services, will also be commissioned by CCGs. <u>'Securing excellence in commissioning for Armed Forces and their families'</u> sets out these commissioner responsibilities for the wider Armed Forces (AF) community.

'Supporting planning for 13/14 for direct commissioning' (complementing 'Supporting Planning 2013/14 for Clinical Commissioning Groups') outlines NHS England's responsibilities around seamless transition of care, the delivery of the AF Covenant and the transfer of 'Mental Health for veterans' services into CCG leadership.

NHS Interim Commissioning Policies

NHS England have now published 37 interim commissioning policies for services which are commissioned directly by NHS England, i.e. AF, Health and Justice and all direct commissioning populations. Creating a set of nationally consistent policies has been a priority, especially where members of the AF communities are concerned, as they are subject to re-locations that can disrupt provision of their healthcare. These are interim policies and consultation on their development is being worked through AF and Health & Justice Clinical Reference Groups over the coming months. A gateway communication notice will be released and widely cascaded to all stakeholders.

NHS Commissioning Intentions 14/15

A commissioning intentions document is soon to be available that will advise providers and key stakeholders of any planned changes to the services Directly Commissioned by the NHS on behalf of serving personnel, mobilised reservists and families registered with

DMS GPs. The document will also support other commissioners of AF Services e.g. DMS, CCGs and other parts of NHS England, such as Dental Commissioning for AF families, IVF services, Secondary Care Mental Health for Serving Personnel, Public Health (e.g. immunisation and screening) and specialist commissioning for complex disability (e.g. prosthetics and wheelchairs).

To continue dialogue with NHS commissioners, NYH AT have organised a meeting in December 2013 for NHS England and the 9 CCGs with military bases, to share and discuss 14/15 commissioning intentions and business planning to provide the necessary assurance to meet recently published 14/15 NHS planning guidance.

Armed Forces Strategic Forum

The NYH AT facilitated the first *Armed Forces Strategic Forum* on October 23rd bringing together the main commissioning organisations with statutory



responsibility for health for the wider AF Community. Representatives from the MoD, NHS, Public Health England and Local Authorities came together with key 3rd Sector partners to discuss commissioning priorities and targets for the next 3-5 years.

The forum provided the opportunity for information sharing and discussion around some of the key issues facing us such as the role of the AFNs, suitability of currently commissioned health services and whether or not commissioners need to consider veterans as a special population.

There is strong support for the Forum to continue on a bi-annual basis and as such the AT will arrange the next meeting for early Spring 2014.

Defence Primary Health Care

Army Primary Health Care Services are currently undergoing a period of transition as they move to support all 3 services (Army, Navy and RAF) in their new role as Defence Primary Health Care (DPHC) under the command of the Surgeon Generals Dept.

The Regional Headquarters for the North is located in the Duchess of Kent Barracks at Catterick Garrison and now has command of 18 Medical Centres that account for around 22,000 patients across the region, including three families' practices at Catterick Garrison, RAF Leeming and RAF Linton-on-Ouse.

As joint commissioners the MOD and NHS England are currently reviewing a number of services that are presently commissioned separately (e.g. out of hours services).

This work is on-going and is vital to ensure that this period of change for both the MOD and the NHS does not affect patient care for those registered at DMS practices.

Phoenix House Recovery Centre

Phoenix House, the new Help for Heroes Recovery Centre at Catterick Garrison has officially opened its The centre is doors. open to all injured, sick or wounded veterans, as well as those still serving and comprises of 46 ensuite bedrooms, 4 family rooms, arts and craft, training and IT facilities, a gym and café.

VETERANS MENTAL HEALTH OUTREACH SERVICES

In response to the Dr Andrew Murrison 2010 Report 'Fighting Fit', funding was allocated via old Strategic Health Authorities (SHAs) and AFNs to support the delivery of initiatives that would improve the availability of Mental Health Services for veterans (£150k p.a., 2011-2015, per SHA).

In the North this comprised of 3 pilot projects, the NE Veterans' Wellbeing Assessment and Liaison Service (VWALS), the Y&H Veterans Mental Health Outreach Service and the NW Military Veterans Improving Access to Psychological Therapies Service (MV IAPT) which was additionally funded from local IAPT money.

Two of the three pilots in the North have recently published their evaluations which demonstrate that the services have been well received and are effective in supporting veterans with a range of mental health disorders and signposting them back into NHS.

On-going work with local CCG's will include dialogue regarding the re-procurement of these valuable services. The North West are further advanced in their discussions and a service specification for the new service has been drawn up with the involvement of CCG colleagues, based on the learning from the evaluation of the service.

Big White Wall

(BWW) provides free, safe, anonymous online support 24/7 by trained counsellors for members of the wider armed forces community, including all serving personnel, veterans/ex-military and families. BWW has already helped over 5.000 members of the AF community and funding from MOD, Department of Health and Help for Heroes is in place to help thousands more. 95% of members report feeling better as a result of using BWW, and 73% talk about something for the first time.

One member of BWW, a decorated soldier with PTSD, said:

"The support given by BWW is fantastic. You are not judged and you can be yourself. Most of us are good at hiding our feelings. This is the only place

I have felt comfortable in expressing myself."

As of this month, 35 out of the 42 covenants (83%) in the 42 (NW) Bde region have been signed, with Salford City Council being the latest to sign this October. Lt Cdr Lee Paddock continues to work with councils to complete the signing of the remaining 7 across the region.

The latest AFCC grant panel sat on 29 October and just under £400,000 worth of application bids were approved throughout the region.

NHS England Delivery of the AF Covenant

NHS England recognises its moral obligation to members of the Armed Forces and their families as set out within the **Armed Forces** Covenant.

Progress in delivery of the AF Covenant so far includes:

- · significant progress in enabling service personnel to access care consistent with other UK citizens with the development of 37 interim commissioning policies
- · the right to retain a position on a waiting list
- · significant investment into the support of veterans' care that falls under the control of CCGs
- the continued development of AFNs as a means of engaging CCGs to discharge their commissioning responsibilities

- enhancement of 9 Disablement Support Centres
- A CCG Armed Forces Tool kit to be launched in January 2014.
- Veterans' Mental Health Network to establish common standards for commissioning of veterans mental health care
- a formal stakeholder group to be established to ensure that patients' and carers' views are taken into account in commissioning plans.

The Hidden Wounds psychological support programme helps veterans, their families and family members/carers of serving personnel suffering from early symptoms of potentially more serious mental health conditions. Launched by Help for Heroes in partnership with Exeter University CEDAR Centre, the programme is currently being developed for delivery in new Hidden Wounds Centres, with the Ist centre to be fully operational within 12 months.
