

<u>Thrush</u>

<u>What is Thrush</u>

Thrush is easily treated usually with a pessary and cream and occasionally with an oral tablet also. Both these therapies are available over the counter by speaking to the pharmacist, without seeing a GP.

It can occur without any reason but is slightly more common after a course of antibiotics or if you are diabetic, pregnant or otherwise ill.

It is NOT considered a sexually transmitted disease.

Pregnant ladies

The pessary is usually considered the safest option if you are pregnant, as with many medications in pregnancy this is off license and you will needs a prescription as the pharmacist will not usually be able to issue this for you.

Recurrent Infections

If you have recurrent multiple episodes in a short period (over a 2-3 months) it is recommended to call the practice to ensure the diagnosis is correct and to ensure there is no other reason why you may be getting these infections
