

Carephone and Assistive Technology

Assistive Technology

This refers to a wide range of gadgets or disability equipment that can help you to live independently in your own home, and give you the freedom to make choices about how you live your life. It includes things like bed occupancy detectors, fall detectors, gas detectors and jar openers, which are easy to use and give you peace of mind.

Carephone

This is a special unit that plugs into your telephone line and can dial for help when you need it. It calls the Carephone Home Safety Service and a trained member of the team will answer the call 24 hours a day, every day. They will talk to you via your Carephone and if you need help they will take the most appropriate action, for example, contact a family member, neighbour, doctor or the emergency services.

The carephone standard and private service charge each week is £3.80 and installation is free. It comes with a pendant which you keep with you (wearing it keeps the battery charged). In an emergency, you need to press the button on your pendant and your Carephone springs into action. It will work in the garden as well as your house. It is advisable to have a key safe fitted when you have a carephone, to enable a carer to gain access (Keysafes can be ordered from Mears on 0800 0324483) It is important to remember to use the button for help if you need it, not just medical emergencies.

Additional gadgets can be fitted if needed – such as fall detectors (vibrates if someone falls), medication dispenser to automatically remind you to take the right tablets at the right time, a GPS watch can relay signals about where someone is (very beneficial for someone with memory problems).

There are now over 5,000 people in Kirklees using the scheme. KOP members using the scheme could not speak highly enough of the benefits of the care phone system - it gives real peace of mind, particularly when living alone.
