Damp & Mould Information & Support Available in Hertfordshire

This flyer has been produced to give front line professionals advice about the health risks of damp and mould in housing and contact details for council Environmental Health teams who can help with concerns.

The health risks of damp and mould in the home:

Respiratory	Other physical health	Mental health

Factors influencing damp and mould in the home:

- Inadequate insulation
- Poor ventilation
- Inefficient, ineffective and or unaffordable heating systems
- Overcrowding
- Disrepair
- High rent cost of living
- Lack of knowledge and or awareness
- Lack of appropriate facilities for clothes drying.

Environmental Health

Environmental Health teams or in some cases, broader Housing departments, have the expertise, competencies, practical experience, and community involvement required to deliver strong health safeguards and effectively promote wellbeing.

Housing safety is one area of regulation carried out.

Housing Conditions

Environmental Health or in some cases, broader Housing departments, will provide advice to all residents and depending on the severity of the damp and mould they can legally require improvements to homes where they are rented. When deciding what action to take, they will consider the chance of harm, how serious it would be, and any extra risk to vulnerable individuals. They work with landlords initially to get improvements informally; however, will act if serious problems are found by:

- Issuing a legal improvement notice requiring works in a certain time period.
- Declaring a legal order prohibiting the use of part or all of a property.
- In some cases, the council will complete the works themselves and charge the landlord.

As well as damp and mould, they will advise and regulate safety standards in all rented homes; this includes risks of falls, fire, cold and electrics.
