

Who can you see?

You don't always need to see a GP in in practice, but who else can see you and treat your problem?

Physician Associates (PA's)

What is a PA?

- PA's are medically trained, generalist healthcare professionals who work alongside doctors and provide medical care.
- PA's can see, treat and refer patient's for further treatment the same as a GP can.
- The main difference is a GP has to sign off their prescriptions.
- We currently have 6 full time PA's in practice with a 7th one joining soon



What is a clinical Pharmacist?

A Clinical Pharmacist works as part of the GP team to make sure your medicine help you to get better and stay well.

They can see patients to do medication reviews, asthma reviews, bp checks, diabetic reviews and medication queries.

We currently have 1 CP working with us in practice.



What is a First Contact Physiotherapist?

FCP are qualified clinical practitioners who can assess, diagnose, treat and manage musculosketal problems.

They can prescribe a programme of exercises, refer for blood tests, x-rays or MRI's or refer to an appropriate secondary care health service.

You do not need to see a GP to be referred into the FCP this can be booked via reception



What is a Social Link Prescriber?

SLP's connect people with local community activities and services that can help improve their health and wellbeing.

Social prescribers can meet different types of non-clinical needs ranging from support and advice with debt, unemployment, housing or mobility issues to talking loneliness by building social connections through joining local community groups, such as walking, singing or gardening.




What can my pharmacist do for me?

Community pharmacists can see patients with minor ailments, such as:

- Earache
- Blood pressure
- Coughs & Cold, Sinusitis, sore throat, Hayfever
- Emergency medicine supply
- Impetigo
- Infected insect bites
- Shingles
- Oral Contraception
