


## In 2017/18, flu vaccinations will be offered under the "NHS flu vaccination programme" to several groups:

### In 2017/18 the following are eligible for flu vaccination:

- people aged 65 years or over (including those becoming age 65 years by 31 March 2018)
- all children aged two to eight (but not nine years or older) on 31 August 2017 (with LAIV)
- all primary school-aged children in former primary school pilot areas (with LAIV)
- those aged six months to under 65 years in clinical risk groups
- pregnant women
- those in long-stay residential care homes
- carers

Frontline health and social care workers should be provided with flu vaccination by their employer. This should form part of the organisations' policy for the prevention of transmission of infection (flu) to help protect patients, residents, and service users as the national flu immunisation programme 2017/18





Antibiotics are important medicines that are used to treat infections caused by bacteria. Bacteria can adapt and find ways to resist the effects of an antibiotic – becoming 'antibiotic resistant' – meaning that the antibiotic no longer kills the bacteria. The more often we use an antibiotic the more likely that the bacteria will become resistant to it.

Antibiotics don't work against infections caused by viruses, such as colds and flus. These common viral infections often get better without antibiotics. Ask your pharmacist about how you can treat your symptoms and pain using over the counter medicine.



## Proposed changes to prescribing guidance

NHS Bromley Clinical Commissioning Group is proposing to no longer support the routine prescribing of self-care medications for health supplements and short lived illnesses that will get better over time. This proposal aims to help reduce the costs of prescribing medicines which can be purchased directly from pharmacists and at the supermarket and so more of their time is spent with patients who have complex health needs. This is a national direction of travel and other CCGs in London have either implemented similar changes or are planning to. GPs will still make a clinical judgement when considering if it is acceptable or appropriate to ask a patient to purchase their medication. Patients with long term chronic treatment such as regular pain in osteoarthritis, frail or housebound patients would still be able to be prescribed these medicines on the NHS.

The proposals are currently being developed and will be discussed in public at the CCG's Governing Body meeting on 20 July at 2pm in the Bromley Council's Council Chambers. Following that discussion, there will be an engagement period of 10 weeks to gather views from patients and the public. Information on the engagement process will be posted on the CCG's website and sent out to GP practices and pharmacists.
