SAIL-presentation by Erin Mee		SAIL is a service for people aged 50+ in Southwark that enables them to access a wide range of local statutory and community services, who can support with home security and fire safety, health and wellbeing, living conditions, and income & finance. The service is coordinated by Age UK Lewisham & Southwark, which has a team of Care Navigators who can visit people in their homes if they wish, to help build a better picture of the support people need and put it in place. SAIL has had increasing numbers of referrals from Primary Care, so three Age UK Care Navigators are now working within various GP practices across Southwark, to support clinical staff to address their patient's social and practical needs. The Care Navigator can liaise with professionals, make onwards referrals, attend clinical and CMDT meets, and PPGs. Working closely with practice staff, by having a base at each practice for a few hours a week, the Care Navigators hope to contribute to a more holistic approach to					

	patient care – from coordinating interventions from social services and occupational therapy, to finding day centres and mobile hairdressers!

11 Kings Fund Report	The research highlights the full extent of the crisis in general practice, finding that the overall number of consultations has increased by 15 per cent (a 13 per cent growth in face-to- face consultations and a 63 per cent growth in telephone consultations) over the last five years, three times the rate of increase in the number of GPs. As well as a growth in the number of onsultations, it shows that general practice's workload has become more complex and intense. The report also underlines the scale of the recruitment and retention crisis facing the profession, finding that fewer GPs are choosing full-time clinical work while many current GPs are retiring earlier and in greater
