Changes to the Prescribing of Medicines in Dudley

Dudley CCG has made some changes to the prescribing of medicines that can be bought over the counter for common, short term illnesses or those that have no or low clinical value. Medicines or products with no or low clinical value are those which have no clear health benefit for patients.

The changes mean that your GP will no longer give you a prescription for certain types of medicines or treatments that are readily available 'over the counter' in pharmacies or on the shelves in shops and supermarkets.

The types of medicines and treatments that fall into this category are known as **Self Care medicines**. These include:

Treatments for minor ailments, including medicines like paracetamol, ibuprofen, head lice lotion and indigestion tablets.

Treatments where there is little evidence that they have a real clinical benefit, including cough syrups, nasal congestion sprays, sore throat products and vitamin supplements.

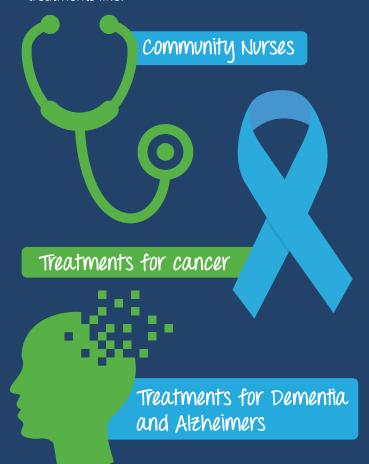
If you need treatment for a long-term chronic condition or there are legal restrictions on the amount of medicine that you can buy over the counter from a community pharmacy, then your GP will still be able to prescribe it.



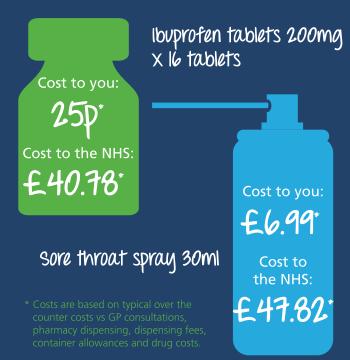
In Dudley the NHS has a fixed amount of money to spend. Once we have spent it on one thing we cannot spend it on another.

It costs the NHS over £40 to prescribe paracetamol and ibuprofen for short-term minor ailments through a GP consultation.





When you've got a minor illness you can't treat at home, and it isn't an emergency, so you should go to your local Pharmacy for quick expert advice.

Your local pharmacist is a trained medicine expert who can offer you free, confidential advice and treatment for a wide range of conditions such as fever, bruising, cuts, teething, sprains, sinus pain and nasal congestion.

They can also answer questions about prescribed and over the counter medicines and no appointment is necessary.
