If you have any concerns about the welfare of a vulnerable adult or child this leaflet has been designed to give you as much help as possible for you determined the best course of action.

What is the definition of a Vulnerable Adult?

A vulnerable adult is a person aged 18 and over, who is or may be:

- In need of community care services by reason of disability, age or illness.
- unable to take care of themselves
- unable to protect themselves against significant harm or exploitation.

Safeguarding adults means making sure that vulnerable adults are protected from abuse or mistreatment.

Abuse or Mistreatment is defined as:

- is a violation of an individual's human and civil rights by another person or persons
- may consist of a single act or repeated acts
- may be an act of neglect or failure to act
- can occur in any relationship or setting
- may result in harm to, or serious exploitation of, the person subjected to it.

What is the definition of a Vulnerable child?

A vulnerable child is a person under the age of 18, who may be at risk of harm or abuse. A child should be protected from any maltreatment that may affect the children's health or development, ensuring that children are growing up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care.

Children can be at risk of harm or abuse in many ways. There are four main kinds of abuse, all of which can cause long term damage to a child:

- <u>Physical Abuse</u> such as hitting, shaking, punching and kicking
- <u>Emotional Abuse</u> not being properly fed, clothed or medical needs not being met
- <u>Neglect</u> when a child is starved of love and affection, or is constantly criticised humiliated or bullied
- <u>Sexual Abuse (including sexual exploitation)</u> inappropriate sexual behaviour, language or assault

Other forms of abuse include:

Bullying, racism and other types of discrimination. Like other kinds of abuse they can harm a child physically and emotionally.

Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)

Female genital mutilation refers to a procedure that intentionally alters or causes injury to the female genital organs for non-medical reasons. **The practice is illegal in the UK.**



It is also illegal to arrange for a child to be taken abroad for the procedure and if caught, offenders face a large fine and a prison sentence of up to 14 years.

If you are worried about someone who is at risk of FGM you should share this information with social care or the police. It is then their responsibility to investigate and protect any girls or women involved.
